At Trevecca, Communicaon majors have a wide varity of choices to fit their speific needs. Students can eceive a Bachelor's Degree in ve specialized majors: Dranatic Arts, Intercultural Comunication, Interpersonal ommunications and Human elatons, Mass Communicaons, and Speech.
As Dramatic Arts majors, tudents develop their skills community, educational, nd/or professional theatre. ttercultural Communication rajors study how they can imrove communication efforts nd relationships with people om other cultures. Interperonal Communication and

The Management and Huian Relations degree comletion program enables dults to finish their degree ithout interrupting their ork schedule. Anyone that pplies for this program hust have sixty-two semeser hours of college credit ith at least a 2.0 GPA, and e twenty-five years of age.
The program is a fifty-sevn week schedule divided to ten five-week modules. he first module is Adult Deelopment and Life Planning. ome of the other modules hclude Personal and Profesional Values, Interpersonal elations, Group and Organiational Behavior, Principles f Management, and Human esources Management. hrough the program, stuents can also receive credit
for life and career experiences such as raising a family or eaming a CPR certificate.
The completion of a Project Thesis is a special degree requirement for the Bachelor of Arts degree in MHR. Students design a project of their own interest that will benefit or improve their organization in some way, then work side-by-side with their employer to apply what they have developed.

The main goal of the Physician's Asistant program at Trevecca Nazarene College is to fully train its students to be ighly competent in assisting and pracicing professional health care procelures. The Allied Health Department repares its Physician's Assistant maors to successfully complete the nationI certifying Examination for Physican ssistants.
A physician's assistant is a qualified ealth practitioner with a background of cademic and clinical experience. Physiians' assistants work dependently uner physicians to provide medical serices in a wide range of conditions and nvironments.
The education process of physician's ssistants is comparable to the training f medical students. The program in-
volves study of anatomy, biochemistry, pharamacology, physical diagnosis physiology, and usually takes twentyfour months to complete.

Many of the Physician's Assistant professors are also involved in other areas of the Allied Health Department. Mary Jo Davenport, Mike Moredock, and Lois Wolfgang teach in the Physician's Assistant program and the Physical Therapy program.

The Physician's Assistant program at Trevecca is the only accredited Physician's Assistant program in the state of Tennessee. Trevecca accepts thirty students into the program every August. (Copy and Design by Ann-Michele Corbi)

In the spring semester of the 1992-1993 school-year, Trevecca entered a contest with Belmont University. Each school was racing to discover who could bring in the most pheresis donors in the month of March.

The American Red Cross Pheresis Program is one in which volunteers donate platelets and other blood products for leukemia, cancer, transplant, aplastic anemia, and other seriously ill patients whose bodies are no longer capable of producing these much-needed blood products on their own.

Platelets are the component of the blood that produce clotting and are known to offset some of the complications that arise from chemotherapy. Platelets from donors are injected into the bodies of patients until their bodies are again capable of producing them.

Trevecca once again proved her willingness to serve. Despite the somewhat frightful two-hour process in which three-fourths of the blood in the donor's body is circulated from one arm, through a machine which removes the platelets, and then back into the donor's other arm, Trevecca students participated and even won the contest. After suffering through seasons of 1991 and 1992, the Trevecca baseball Trojans have resurfaced to a position of respect in NAIA District 24 and the TCAC. During the previous two seasons, the Trojans only managed a total of 20 wins. But 1993 was to be different. The team finished with a 27-21 record and qualified for the eight team NAIA District 24 Tournament by finishing fourth in the TCAC. At the toumament, the Trojans won two and lost two to finish fourth in the District.
Several players contributed to the successful tum-around this season. The team was led offensively by MVP Roger Brown, a hard-hitting, slick fielding sophomore third baseman from Canada who pounded out 16 home runs and had 51 RBI'S, and hitting .345. ## Nashville, Tennessee

Trevecca Nazarene College, located in Nashville, is much more than a campus community. Many students are actively involved in local churches, businesses, and other organizations. Reaching out to Nashville is an integral part of being a Treveccan.


Volume number 69 of the 1993 Trevecca Nazarene College Darda, was printed by the Josten's Printing and Publishing Company located in Clarksville, Tennessee. A total of 650 books were printed at a total cost of over $\$ 21,000$. The cost of the book to students is covered in the general fee which the student pays at the beginning of each semester. Each student is entitled to a book if they have attended for both the Fall and Spring semesters consecutively. If a student has attended for only one semester the cost of the book is $\$ 10$ while the cost to the faculty and staff is $\$ 15$.

This $9 \times 12$ book features a firebrand vinyl embossed cover with gold foil stamping. Parchment endsheets with a maroon stamp opened and closed the book.

The thematic statement "Charting the Course" was carried out on the division pages and the folio tabs. The length of the publication is 208 pages. The book contains 24 color pages and 8 pages of spot color.

The typeface used as Benguiat Book. The picture captions were set in 8 point Benguiat, and the body copy was set in 10 point Benguiat. Most headlines were set in 60 point Benguiat.

Michael's Photography out of Smyrna, Tennessee shot all the faculty, staff, senior, and underclass portraits. The staff appreciates the hard work of Michael, Chris, and all the others at the studio.

The Josten's representatives Kelly Jackson and Harold McGehee have worked very close with the staff from the book's inception.
