ncy Hazlewood has been an instructor in Trevecca's acher Education Program since 1978. Prior to coming Trevecca, she taught at East Tennessee State iversity for ten years and held several positions in public schools.

Strickland brings to a close thirty-six years of tstanding service to Trevecca as both a faculty mber and an administrator. For seventeen years, m 1974-1991 and longer than any other person, he d the position of academic dean. Prior to that term, also served one year as dean of students. A total of 650 books were printed at a total cost of over $\$ 23,000$. The cost of the book to students is covered in the general fee which the student pays at the beginning of each semester. Each student is entitled to a book if they have attended both the Fall and Spring semesters consecutively.
Michael's Photography out of Smyrna, Tennessee, photographed all of the faculty, staff, administration, and student portraits.
This $9 \times 12$ book features a craftline embossed cover in smoke with silver foil stamping and royal purple ink. It has a mission grain. The endsheets are violet.
The theme of "Celebrating the Memories" was carried out on the division pages. The length of the publication is 184 pages. The book contains 24 color pages and 8 pages of spot color.
The typeface used was Palatino, with much of the copy done in Helvetica. The lead-ins of the captions were set in 12 point font while the body of the captions was set in 10 point font.
