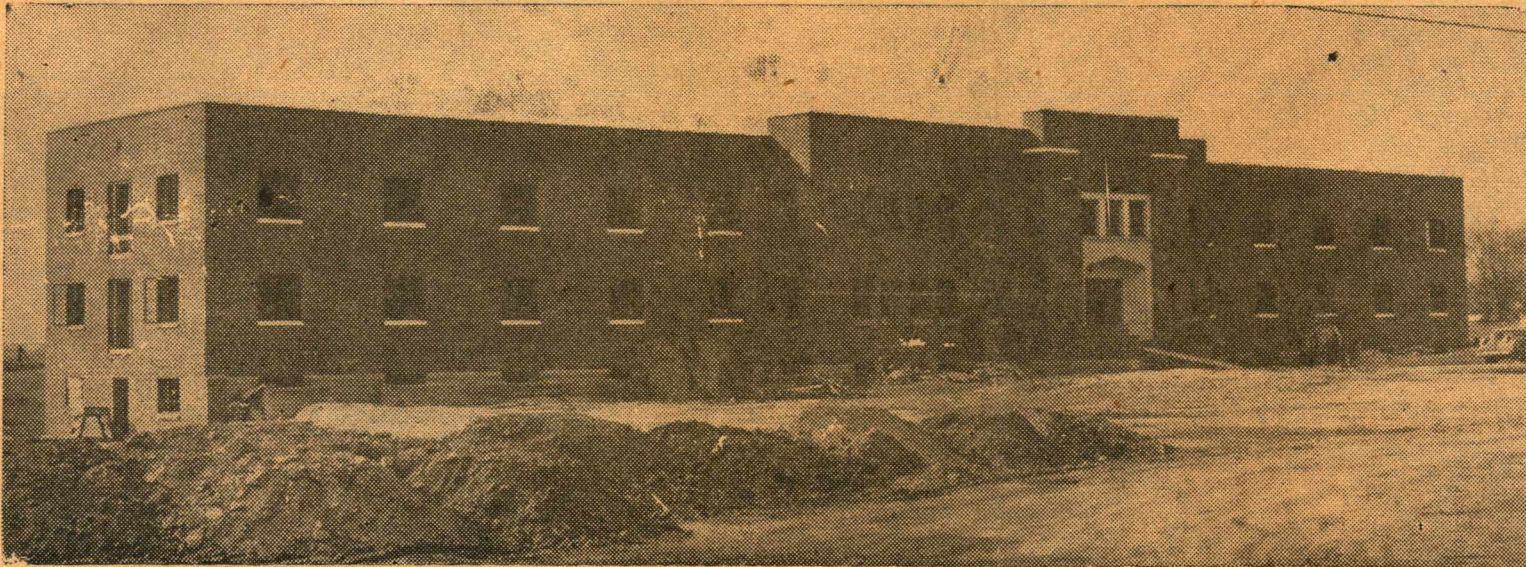

Record-Breaking Improvements Progress

Campus Projects Exceed Quarter-Million Mark

With anticipation of an increase in enrollment this fall, the administration of N.N.C. has undertaken an extensive program of improvements during the summer months, costing \$300,000, L. Wesley Johnson, business manager for the college reported last week. The program is still in progress, and when completed will be the most extensive in the history of the college.

Largest undertaking is the addition of Chapman Hall, new men's dormitory, named in honor of the late Dr. J. B. Chapman. This structure alone, which will house 160 students will account for two thirds of the entire sum.

Returning students will notice other changes on the campus; Gideon Hall is being remodeled to accommodate the fine arts section of the college curriculum, including the music and art departments. The heating plant has had two new boilers added and the steam lines repaired to take care of the increased heating needs of the college.

The academy will have a new home in the government building located between the library and Gideon Hall.

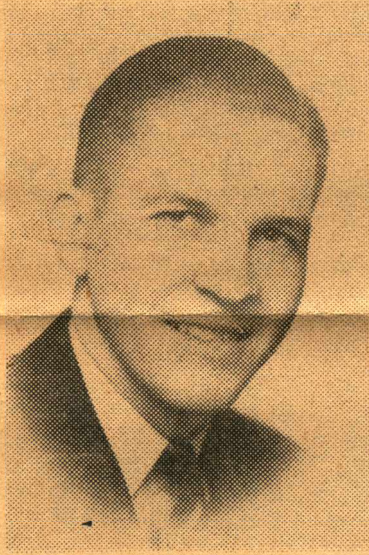
Dining Hall Improved

Students will be glad to hear that there will be no long waits in the chow lines this year, due to additional room provided in the dining hall by the addition of a government building just south of Morrison Hall, which will serve as a kitchen and cafeteria, enabling students to be served family style meals.

Cooks and kitchen helpers will be assisted in their jobs by \$10,000 worth of new electrical kitchen equipment obtained from the government, including ovens, dishwashers, etc.

Construction of two new duplexes behind Briarwood Hall will solve the housing problem for four lucky faculty members and their families. Biology classes and other student groups who plan field trips will be transported in a new bus furnished from surplus government stocks. Painted a bright orange with a silver top, the bus is large enough to accommodate most class groups.

DuBois To Speak at Opening Convention

The college year opens with a convention beginning Tuesday evening, September 16, and continuing over Sunday, September 21, college authorities revealed last week. The speaker for this year is Rev. Lauriston J. DuBois, General Secretary of the Nazarene Young People's Society with headquarters at Kansas City.

Rev. DuBois is a member of the Alumni Association of N.N.C., graduating with the class of 1935, and for a time was president of the Alumni Association. He holds his Master's Degree in Philosophy from the University of Idaho, and has been very successful in the work of the Church and has served several pastorates including Bethel Church, Spokane, and Newton, Kansas, from which he was called to fill his present office, at the last General Assembly.

He has been very successful in his work with young people and is a very forceful speaker and accomplished singer. Both he and his wife sing duets in connection with their work with young people.

The Student Body and Faculty of N.N.C. welcome Rev. DuBois and his message.

Hospital Expands

Samaritan hospital will inaugurate their new building and expansion program with a groundbreaking ceremony to be held Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 16, at 2 o'clock, it was revealed by Nelson Ammons, business executive of the hospital late last week. Civic leaders and city officials as well as hospital board members will be present.

Rev. Melza H. Brown, chairman of the hospital board and pastor of First Nazarene church here will preside at the ceremony. Hospital board members from all of the northwest area will be present.

Mayor Peter Johnson and Van Moad, Chamber of Commerce president will speak briefly, representing the city. Dr. A. L. Parrott, hospital field director, started the fund raising campaign rolling last spring, but will be unable to attend the ceremonies.

Culver Hails New Health Program

Revelation of a greatly expanded health program for students was made late last week by Dr. Thelma B. Culver, Dean of the College.

For the first time in this college's history entering freshmen were given physical examinations and skin tests, primarily for the detection of tuberculosis. Reactors will receive chest X-rays free of charge under the new set up, Miss Culver advised.

"I think we have it well within our facilities to have the best health services of any college in the state," Dr. Culver announced, and explained that through arrangements with the Miss Frances Goodwin, Executive Secretary of the Idaho Anti-Tuberculosis Association, the college will be allowed up to one thousand dollars worth of chest X-rays free of charge. Present plans call for physical examinations for freshmen only, with hopes for a complete program for all students in the near future.

Terming it as "a very important phase of education", Dr. Culver proclaimed the step as one which would go far toward improving the health status of the entire student body.

Possibility that Dr. Robert Mangum, the school Physician would be able to arrange for a nurse to be on duty at the college for at least an hour a day five days a week was voiced, but as yet such plans are not completed.

Saturday's physical examinations were reminiscent of service days, when the G.I.'s lined up to say "Ah".

New Book Store Completed; Webb Chief Custodian

Completion of the new book store with greatly increased stocks was hailed this week by Miss Olive Webb, custodian, as one of the improvements on the campus that will immediately increase student comfort and efficiency. As well as an increase in the stocks of purely school supplies, increased room has made it possible to offer many other items, such as tax-free toilet articles, stationery, Bibles, gum, candy bars, school pennants, etc.

The new location of the book store is in the basement of the administration building directly across the hall from the registrar's office.

Beanery Opens

Dreams come true! That's right. This year, under the managership of the Rev. Herman Fisher, N.N.C. students will be able to get pop, hamburgers, milkshakes, french-fries, hot donuts, and sandwiches, as well as ice cream in the new cafeteria immediately south of Morrison Hall.

Mr. Fisher announced that meal tickets for the dining hall proper would not be good in the cafeteria but that all profits would be turned into the dining hall fund to increase the quality of meals served there during the year.

Meals in the regular dining hall will be served family-style, eliminating the "chow line" of last year. The noon meal will be split into two sections to accommodate students who have noon classes.

Summer Study to Improve Curriculum

Miss Ethel G. Allison, Professor of Elementary Education at Northwest Nazarene College, returned to Nampa last Thursday from a summer's post-graduate study at Columbia University in New York City. Miss Allison holds a Master's degree from the University of Washington. While at Columbia, Professor Allison studied the latest trends in the field of elementary teacher education. In addition to her work in New York, Miss Allison travelled in various sections of the United States, visiting in New Orleans, Boston, and Canada. While in eastern Canada she was the guest of Thelma Golden Fidler, former world's champion fastball pitcher, in Toronto, Canada.

Miss Allison's work at Columbia was done in correlation with a series of activities in the education department at N.N.C. Professor Thelma B. Culver, head of the Department of Education, received the degree of Doctor of Education from the University of Colorado last fall. Dr. Culver majored in teacher-training and curriculum. Since then she has participated in regional conferences in Seattle and elsewhere. D. G. Laughlin, supervisor of the college grade and high schools, received his M. A. in Education from Colorado State College of Education at Greeley, Colorado.
