Farewell to Dr. Loren and Linda Gresham



Dr. Loren P. Gresham will retire on July 31, 2017. At that time, he will have led Southern Nazarene University as president for 28 years. For the 22 years preceding his presidency, Dr. Gresham served SNU in other administrative, teaching, and coaching roles.

"When Dr. Gresham retires in July," said Dr. Terry Rowland, the Board of Trustees' vice-chair, "it will have been 50 years since he arrived here as a young political science professor.

"Dr. Gresham's record of leadership at SNU is unsurpassed," said Dr. Brad Moore, Chair of the SNU Board of Trustees. "He leads with wisdom, passion and vision. Both he and Linda care deeply about SNU's students, faculty, staff and constituents." Loren Gresham came to SNU, then Bethany Nazarene College, in 1967. He became a Fulbright Scholar, spending a year of research in New Zealand. Gresham was named provost of the university in 1985, and in 1989 the Board of Trustees elected him to be the institution's 14th president. During Gresham's presidency, SNU has had 27 consecutive years of balanced budgets. Last fall's total enrollment of 2,254 was the all-time high in SNU's 117year history.

Gresham is in the Oklahoma Higher Education Hall of Fame and was named to the 2014 class of Most Admired CEOs in Oklahoma City. He has served on the boards of the YMCA of Greater Oklahoma City, the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, and Integris Baptist Medical Center.

GERMANS IN SWAZILAND



We first went to Swaziland in July 2014. Then, on June 29, 2017, "Here We Go Again." Barbi Moore asked us to return as the 2017-18 On Site Coordinators for the Bethany First Church Partnership with Swaziland.

So what about this? How do I feel? People ask if I'm excited and I say "no." I've been there, know the land and people, and understand the job description inside and out. There is the sense of being in God's divine will for our lives. Having been home for a year and a half, when I talk about Swaziland, I still well up with emotion, and wipe tears from my eyes. I realize I could not be going back again except with a heart for Africa and a love for the Swazi people. I have a soul stirring compassion for the most helpless and vulnerable of the world: AIDS infected orphans, sick, homeless, and hungry.

There's an old saying which I'm finding it true for me; "When you leave Africa you never get the dust of Africa out of your heart." To my own amazement, I find even now when I talk about Swaziland, my heart is beating Africa, Africa, Africa.

The first year there, I wrote about 68 blogs. I wrote about first impressions. I wrote about people, places,

pleasant things and pestilences. I wrote about BFC's partnership, how it ministered to AIDS victims, orphans, churches, about involvement in nursing, education, dentistry, farming, Celebrate Recovery, and pastoral leadership. The reach of our influence is incalculable.

I don't know what I'll be writing in volume 2 of <u>http://germansinswaziland.com</u>. I'll just tell you what I see, what I feel, what I think you should know, and I trust what I write will inform, inspire and entertain.

So now, Here We Go Again. Let's share the second half of 2017 and first half of 2018 together. I expect we'll laugh and cry along the way and, through it all, I hope you always feel intimately involved in BFC's Partnership with Swaziland.

Thank you, Pastor Harvey, Barbi Moore, and all BFC for the thrilling experience you are entrusting to us once again. The financing for BFC's coordinators in Africa for a year is a challenge.

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Dwight E. Neuenschwander

Dwight Edward Neuenschwander was born to Eugene and Irene Harless Neuenschwander, on April 16, 1930, in Liberal, Kansas, and departed this life on March 28, 2017.



He grew up in western Kansas, the Missouri Ozarks, and southern Texas.

In 1948, Dwight graduated from high school in Bastrop, Texas, and then served in the United States Navy and Air Force. He attended Southern Nazarene University, receiving his degree in 1956.

He married Evonne Striegel of Norman in 1950. Together, they pastored congregations in Kansas and Colorado. In 1968, they joined the faculty of Nazarene Bible College in Colorado Springs. He earned a Master's degree from the University of Northern Colorado in 1975. Two years later, they moved to Kansas City for an assignment at Nazarene international headquarters. In 1980, Dwight was appointed District Superintendent for New Zealand, followed by eleven years as District Superintendent of the Nebraska district. He was awarded an honorary doctorate from Mid-America Nazarene University in 1992.

Evonne passed away in 2003 after 52 years of marriage. Dwight later married Eula Mae Stipe of Oklahoma City. Dwight enjoyed hands-on projects, including building two houses for family members. He doted on his grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Dwight is survived by his wife Eula Mae, brother Virgil of Choctaw, son Ed and wife Rhonda of Piedmont, daughter Nancy and husband Mike Howie of Bradleyville, MO, stepson Paul Stipe of Dallas, TX, step-daughter Denise Fitch of OKC, fifteen grandchildren and fifteen great-grandchildren.

Dwight's funeral service was held at Bethany First Church of the Nazarene on April 3. Friends are invited to contribute in Dwight's name to SNU's foundation for student scholarships.

Jane just completed a three-year term on the Board of Directors of the Oklahoma City Branch of the Kansas City Federal Reserve. She currently serves as President-Elect of the Oklahoma Society of CPAs, as a member of the American Bankers Association Card Solutions Board and as a board member of MetaFund, a private equity and venture capital firm.

She has served on the Administrative Council for the American Bankers Association Community Bankers Council and on the FDIC's Community Bank Advisory Council in Washington D.C. She has been Chairman of the Board of the Northwest Chamber of Commerce.

Jane has written book reviews for the ABA Banking Journal, the trade publication of the American Bankers Association. In 2012 she was awarded the Outstanding CPA in Industry by the Oklahoma Society of CPA's.
