After leaving Switzerland, our next stop was Paris. We spent the night on the south side. We planned to take the subway downtown to the famous sites the next day. But that morning the subway was bombed. So we visited Versailles, the palace of Louis XIV and the place where the armistice ending WWI was signed.

From there we drove to Normandy, France, where we visited Du Mont Saint Michel. Though the Abby sits on a granite hill in the Atlantic Ocean, at low tide we could drive to it and visit the church and village. Then we drove to the Normandy Beaches, where some 10,000 American soldiers are buried.

Next we drove through the French countryside, through Luxemborg, to the Belgian border and back to Germany. By chance we came across the Cave City at Neown, France. Discovered in the 3rd century BC, the cave provided the villagers protection from conquering armies. The cave city was also used by the German and Allied High Commands during WWI and

We spent two of our final three nights at Prun, Germany, in a quaint little hotel with a great restaurant. From Prun we drove up to Cologne and visited the Cathedral and took a boat ride on the Rhine. The stained glass windows in the Cathedral are works of art.

Our final Sunday we drove back to Frankfort and from there we flew back to the United States on October 23rd.

> NO EASTER: NO HOPE by Arthur E. Barkley

As we Christians celebrate Easter, hundreds of false religions deny the deity of Jesus. It is a rare

year, in fact, that has not seen the birth of some "new" religion. Reproducing almost every system of philosophy which went to its grave centuries ago, modern cults, for the most part, are simply ancient heresies wearing a new dress. Spotlighting a few of these heresies reveals the utter hopelessness their followers endure.

Sun Myung Moon, a Korean, claims that, on Easter morning 1936, Jesus spoke to him in a vision. Jesus urged Mood to carry out the mission He was unable to complete. Jesus failed to marry and reproduce physical children and establish the perfect family. Moon, therefore, as the new Messiah and Father God, along with Mrs. Moon, as Mother God, produce the "perfect family." Thus, they are doing what Jesus failed to do.

Though thousands of youth are attracted to this warm family that meets many of their needs, they wake up too late. They soon learn that Moon demands total sacrifice, absolute obedience, and unquestioned devotion. They are forced to stay on the streets until they raise a specified quota of money--mostly through selling books and flowers. Yet their perverted sense of family keeps these devotees in line.

Since becoming a permanent resident of the United States in 1973, Moon and The Unification Church have amassed a financial empire. July 16, 1982, Moon was sentenced to 18 months in jail and a \$25,000 fine for income tax evasion. If this so-called "sole vehicle of salvation" is their only hope, surely Moonies are forlorn.

Transcendental Meditation, the teachings of Maharisha Mehesh Yogi, was developed and delivered some 5,000 years ago by the Hindu god, Krishna. Yogi declared 1975 the first year in the "Age of Enlightenment," 1977 the "Year of the Ideal Society," and 1978 the "Year of Invincibility to Every Nation."

TM has some 400 centers in the USA, with 7,000 teachers initiating new meditators at the rate of 30,000 a month. TM is Westernized Hinduism expressed in scientific terms, but with the strict discipline removed, and offered to Americans who are empty of spirit. It is taught in universities, high schools, and the US Army. On

drug trips victims learn to recognize many "gods" of the Hindu religion. Who would have believed 20 years ago that millions of people in our culture would be calling on Hindu deities to possess them, and doing it in the name of science, convinced that what they were practicing had nothing to do with religion? Pretending to meet the needs of young and old, TM leads to the blind alley of hopelessness without Christ.

The Way International was founded in 1958 by Victor Paul Weirwille. A former pastor of the Evangelical Reformed Church of Van Wert, Ohio, Weirwille believes that through the Way's ministry, God is revealing insights hidden since the days of St. Paul. He claims to have the only correct interpretation of the Word since the first century.

The Way meets in homes. It promotes its heresy through a video POWER taped course ABUNDANT LIVING monthly magazine "The Grapevine." It has a college in Emporia, Kansas, holdings in Farmington, New Mexico, and new headquarters in New Knoxville, Ohio. The Way received unwanted publicity, however, when sued for breach of promise. A paraplegic claimed he gave the organization \$201,000, two expensive automobiles, and other donations in exchange for the promise that he would be healed and walking within a year. When he wasn't healed, he sued. He won the case and got his money back.

Someone has said that the more authoritarian a cult leader is, the better he or she feels. If so, Paul Weirwille and his successor Craig Martindale need no physician. They seem to share Jim Bakker's view: "As long as stupid people are foolish enough to send it (money), I'll take it."

The Apostle Paul said: "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable (I Cor. 15:19). Thank God, for the hope the message of Easter brings to us who believe.
