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Business Men Interested

The Business Men of Nampa want Northwest Nazarene College to be free from debt and grow. They expressed their interest by selecting a Committee of leading men to consider the possibility of doing something definite to aid in the present Out-of-Debt Campaign. A committee from the Board of Directors of Northwest Nazarene College met with them and the Business Men's Committee agreed to underwrite a minimum of \$11,000.00 and endeavor to secure as much as \$15,000.00. Thank God for the Business Men of Nampa. God is answering prayer. We have had many nights of prayer and several noon hours have been spent in the Chapel in fasting and prayer that God would aid us. He is doing it. Has God spoken to you? Have you answered Him? We have nearly \$65,000.00 underwritten. Will you help on the last \$15,000.00? If you will, send your subscription today.

High School Accredited-Continued

The College of Liberal Arts is recognized by the State Board of Education of Idaho to such an extent that our students who have completed two years of college work with at least twelve hours' work in Education are granted State Elementary Teacher's Certificates. The students who graduate from the College of Liberal Arts with a major in Education are granted State High School Teacher's Certificates. At the present time there are dozens of our former students making good both as elementary teachers and High School teachers.

The work of our College Department is also accepted in full by several Universities and Colleges. At present the

administration is endeavoring to meet the full requirements of the Association of Colleges for membership.

No previous attempt had been made to have our High School fully accredited by the State. We were meeting the requirements in all but two small details: one was the cataloguing of the Library and the other was in the length of the school year. During the summer the Library was catalogued, according to the Dewey Decimal System, and the school year was lengthened to thirty-six weeks. Application was made to the Board of Education, and inspection was made, and below is the statement of Mr. P. H. Soulen, State High School Inspector:

"The courses offered meet Idaho's requirements in subjects, length of periods, number of weeks per year, and in the matter of pupils and teacher load.

"All study work is under supervision and rigid regulations for the proper control of social, recreational and study activities are maintained.

"Permanent records of students' grades are filed, and six-week reports are made to parents and guardians.

"Ample library facilities are provided, the Academy Seniors being allowed study privileges in the College Library and Freshmen, Sophomores and Juniors have access to library books and magazines.

"The strong missionary spirit which dominates throughout the school compensates largely for the low salaries which the teachers receive.

"I recommend that the Northwest Nazarene Academy, Nampa, Canyon County, Idaho, be placed upon the accredited list of High Schools of Idaho."

The following is the notification from W. D. Vincent, Commissioner of Education:

"It gives me pleasure to notify you of favorable consideration by the State Board of Education of your recent application for placement on the Idaho list of Accredited Schools. On the basis of the Inspector's approved report, your school was, by resolution, officially recognized and included in the Idaho list of Accredited High Schools."

Therefore we are glad to announce to

Therefore we are glad to announce to our constituency that our High School is fully accredited. If you have young people who should attend an accredited school under Christian influence and safe teaching send for further particulars concerning courses and expenses and begin now to plan to have them enroll next September.

Let us educate our own young people in our own Institutions.

David is the older of the boys and is studying to be prepared to return to Africa as an old-fashioned pioneer missionary. Elmer plans to study medicine upon completion of his college work and then return to Africa as a Medical Missionary. Beather and Sister Calmalarche. ary. Brother and Sister Schmelzenbach have been on the field for twenty-two years and are considered among our best missionaries. When the annals of Africa Missions are fully recorded they will go down with such men as Living-stone, Paton and Morrison. Brother Schmelzenbach has never returned to the homeland since his departure over a score of years ago. He has always been so busy that he felt that he could not afford to take the time to come to America. We all hope that some means may be found by which he may be at Columbus next June. His presence would create great missionary enthusiasm and his very coming would probably mean more missionaries for Africa and more money for that sacred cause.

We, as a Faculty and Student-Body, are glad to welcome these children of our great Missionaries. We are doubly glad because they bring us greetings from Miss Louise Robinson, who is one of our finest missionaries in Africa and is a graduate of Northwest Nazarene College. Soon Miss Fairy Chism, another graduate of N. N. C. and former classmate of Miss Robinson, is to sail for Africa to join that splendid band of missionaries in the work of the Lord. Also with Miss Chism will sail Prof. William C. Esselstyn and wife, now of Wollaston, Massachusetts. Professor Esselstyn is a former classmate of President DeLong, and Mrs. Esselstyn a classmate of Mrs. DeLong. So we shall have a strong tie binding us to Africa from now on with the Schmelzenbach children here, and Misses Robinson and Chism and Prof. and Mrs. Esselstyn there.

The Value of Books

Paul the apostle was at once a thinker, a politician and a theologian, because he kept himself informed relative to the current events of his time. While being confined behind prison bars in Rome, we hear him bursting forth with his vital truth to his friend of Ephesus, in regard to study and self-culture by the medium of books. "Study to show thyself a workman," was indeed one of his maxims.

And today our greatest need is not the increase of new and better means of locomotion, nor other luxuries and Modern civilization has one of its greatest contributions to human of its greatest contributions to human progress already at hand, namely, the opportunity of reading good books. Should Edison or Marconi be able to talk to a citizen of Mars by a radio wave, the first message of importance would not be that of their looms and factories, but of the accumulated knowladge in store wind through nest con-

edge in store gained through past centuries.

For the aspiring youth the reading hours are among the greatest assets. "Books are the levels-not by lowering the great, but by lifting up the small."
Milton said, "The book is the precious life-blood of the master spirit." They tell the story of the Wandering Jew, so that man need not spend his life-time in first hand knowledge by experience. Instead, they give him a goal to travel to-ward and, at the same time, relieve him of many pitfalls of personal experience. Thus we may clasp hands with Lincoln, he reaches back to Washington and they both tell us a story of how they were instructed through a Cromwell or Solo-

Life is too short for learning by conversation and travel alone. The dead of past ages must speak to us with advice. Louis XIII surrounded himself with a guard of mosquetaries for his benefit, but today our president asks for a cabinet. No one knows how to grope his way into a dim future. A guide and directors are necessary. Then experience supplemented by a council of advisors enables one to learn more in one year, than experience alone could teach him in twenty-five.

After a forenoon of hurried preparation we managed to pull out of Nampa at noon. Driving about forty miles per hour the first day, we reached La Grande in time for the scheduled night service there. We left early Wednesday in order to cover the long distance to Camas, Washington. We had a fine service at the Camas Church and received a hearty response there by our people. Thursday morning we got ready as early as possible, because we had a long day before us, as Tillamook, a city about six miles from the Pacific Coast, was our next stopping place. Meeting with the Tillamook people in their own beautiful church, we enjoyed together the splendid evening service there. Friday night we visited the Hemlock church, meeting with a splendid congregation of young folks. Saturday we held a meeting at McMinnville.

Sunday morning we worshipped together with the people of Salem. Indeed, we had to admit that our staying there gave us inspiration to press on for the cause which we presented. Sunday evening we visited the Newberg church, and the following week presented our campaign at Tacoma, Centralia, View, and Beaverton.

After having our noon-day lunch, we started on our home trip. This was possibly the longest and most dreary of all previous ones, as we had to cover distances of about 300-350 miles a day in order to hold meetings at Kelso and Grandview on our way home. We arrived home safe and sound Wednesday morning, after having spent about three weeks out on the field. We can report a successful trip, and feel to say that we made some progress toward the consummation of our goal—to see our school free from all debt.
