## Opening Convention

As has been customary the College year will open with a short convention beginning Tuesday, September 24 and continuing over Sunday, September 29. Services will be held at the College Chapel each morning at 10:30 and at the local Church of the Nazarene each evening at 8:00. We have been fortunate in securing the following persons as speakers.

**Rev. E. E. Martin**, who is the new pastor of the College Church, will speak once a day. Brother Martin has been a pastor for over twenty years, serving such churches as Calgary, Alberta, Canada; Meridian, and Ontario, Idaho; and Lowell, and Worcester, Massachusetts. He comes to us with rich experience and with great ability as a preacher. We are also glad, indeed, to have Brother Martin with us because of the fact that he is an alumnus of Northwest Nazarene College, having graduated from the College of Liberal Arts with the class of 1924. Sister Martin will be a great help during the school year with her exhortations and messages. We are hoping to have her speak several times to the young ladies. We also welcome the family to Northwest Nazarene College, most of the members of which will become members of our student body. Under the spiritual leadership of Brother Martin, as he is led by the Holy Spirit, we look forward to a great school year. You are invited to come and hear him preach at our Opening Convention.

**Rev. Roy F. Smee**, who is our successful pastor at Calgary, Alberta, Canada, will be the other main speaker during the Convention. Brother Smee comes to us recognized as one of the most efficient pastors in the Church of the Nazarene. He has had a long pastorate with the Calgary Church, which is by far the largest Nazarene Church in Canada. Brother Smee is a great believer in Christian education, having spent several years in our College at Pasadena. Every year he has had several of his young people enrolled in Northwest Nazarene College. We are looking forward with anticipation to his visit to us. We invite you to come and benefit from the stirring messages he will give us at the Opening Convention.

**Professor Harold W. Gretzinger** will have charge of the music. We hope to have a large choir and orchestra to assist in the song services. Professor Gretzinger will also render several selections on the marimba.

The College Male Quartet will be present and will sing several times at each service. The Quartet has had a very successful sum-

mer touring our Educational Zone for new students. They have traveled nearly 12,000 miles and have sung to thousands of people. If you have heard them once you will want to hear them again.

In addition to those mentioned above, President DeLong, Dr. Winchester, Business Manager Henson, members of the Faculty and many others will be on hand to make the services profitable. We are hoping also that our own District Superintendent, Rev. A. E. Sanner, and some of the other District Superintendents from our Zone will find it possible to be present. Many pastors have already signified their intention of being here. They plan to drive through, bringing students with them. In brief we are looking forward to a great time and we want you to come and enjoy the Convention with us and at the same time see Northwest Nazarene College and our student body and Faculty.

## The First Chapel Service

For many years one of the outstanding features of Commencement has been what is known as the last chapel service. This has always been a time of great inspiration and blessing. This year we are inaugurating what is to be known as the first chapel service, which will be held at 10:00 o'clock Wednesday morning, September 25. Several interesting things will be on the program such as the introduction of Faculty members, members of the Board of Directors and visiting friends, songs by the Male Quartet, and testimonies of students, both old and new. ## Improvements

A number of improvements have been made in the past few weeks on the campus and buildings and more will be made before registration day, September 23. We are endeavoring to have the class rooms, dormitories and campus in good condition for the school year. The main halls in the administration building have been kalsomined. Room 14, which has been the Academy Study Hall, has been revamped considerably, a new floor having been laid and the ceiling and walls replastered and retinted. Rooms 10 and 12, the Academy

Principal's office, and the Commercial room have been kalsomined. In addition to the above improvements, the floors have been cleaned and oiled. During the past year our Library was over-crowded. Before the opening of school we hope to enlarge the Library to include Room 2.

Not only is the Administration Building receiving attention, but both Dormitories are being cleaned and repairs are being made where needed. Up to the present, at least a dozen rooms and the halls have been retinted. The furniture is being varnished and stained where needed. Dean Wallace is arranging the girls' parlor in attractive style with new draperies and new rugs, pictures, floor lamps, etc. We also expect to purchase a new parlor set for the girls' dormitory. In addition, the Dean is preparing a "library den" and a "fudge kitchen." Things will be real homey in the girls' dormitory this year.

Dean Bartram of the men's dormitory has just arrived from his vacation in Canada and will soon have the dormitory in fine shape for the arrival of his young men.

Professor Jacobson will arrive ten days before the opening of the first semester and as usual will have the dining room in excellent condition for your arrival.

The Junior High and Grammar School building is also receiving its share of attention from the improvement squad.

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## Important Notice

It is evident from the present indications that we will be forced to utilize every available space both for class rooms and for dormitory rooms. We do not desire to go to any unnecessary or unwarranted expense. At present the dormitory situation is becoming a problem. The 20th of August every room in the girls' dormitory had been reserved. Since that time a number of young ladies have sent in money for reservations and every mail brings more, and we are finding it necessary to double up as far as possible. Therefore, we will be forced to deny single rooms to any student unless it is absolutely necessary and to urge all students to assist us by meeting this crowded condition in good spirit and make the best of it, and thank God that he is sending such a host of young people to our institution.

If you are planning to room in the dormitory, please notify us at once, so that we can make necessary arrangements. If the dormitory is over-crowded we have prospects of securing a fine house, adjacent to the campus, where we can place a number of girls; probably the upper division college girls will be assigned here if the necessity arises.

We would call attention to the ruling that all students not living at home must reside in the dormitory unless permission is granted from the President's office to reside elsewhere. If it becomes necessary to secure a house to accommodate the over-flow it would have the same status as the dormitory and would be under the same supervision.
