President DeLong addressed a meeting Wednesday evening, April 27, at Star, Idaho, of the Ada County Holiness Association. A college male quartet sang several numbers.

Sigma Lambda Alpha literary society presented an evening program on Friday, April 29, entitled "Americanus Sumus." It was to observe the Washington Bicentennial anniversary.

Rev. Ray Davis, pastor of the Caldwell (Ida.) church, spoke in chapel on Thursday, May 12. The text for his message was Luke 2:44, "But they, supposing him to have been in the company, went a day's journey."

"We are careful about our homes, our automobiles, our stocks and bonds and other material things, but I wonder if we are careful about the things of the heart," he said. "Many have gone a great way these days supposing they have had Christ with them. We must be examples of the life of Christ."

Miss Cora Ludlow, Dawson, Minn., Academy senior, took third place in the district book-keeping contest in Boise on Friday, April 29. For the first time three students from our Academy entered the contest. Twenty-three competed. Of the seven trios entered for group honors, Miss Ludlow, Harley Vail, Nampa, and Miss Cleo Baird, Halfway, Oregon, all students of the N. N. A., were awarded third place.

Class picnics replaced school work on Friday, May 13. The College seniors and juniors embarked early in the morning for Barrel Springs, a mountain stream sixty miles from Nampa. The College freshmen and sophomores went to the hills. The Academy juniors and seniors observed their picnic day at Northside Park.

Baseball is in full swing on the campus. The Alpha Delta Phi men are out in the lead with three games won and one lost. The Sigma Lambda Alphas are behind with one victory and three defeats. The Olympians are in the middle of the road. The Alpha Delta Phi girls are in the lead in their division. Each team plays every other team three times.

Senior investiture day, Tuesday, May 3, was at once impressive and saddening. Hearts beat a bit faster when, for the first time, twenty-seven young men and women donned the cap and gown and marched in processional down the aisles of the new chapel to be seated on the platform.

Dr. Olive M. Winchester, vice president of the college, delivered a short message to the class. Every member arose, and in short talks, told what N. N. C. had meant to him and what he intended to do in the future. President DeLong introduced members of the class to visiting friends.

A feature of the investiture day exercises was the presence of Dr. H. F. Reynolds, 78-year-old senior general superintendent of the Church of the Nazarene. Doctor Reynolds spoke briefly to the graduating class.

Every member of the 1932 class, twenty-seven strong, professes an experience of salvation. The class runs true to form in this respect, for every preceding class in the history of N. N. C. has been thus united.

We were privileged at N. N. C. to have with us from May 4 to 8 the Idaho-Oregon district assembly in its twentieth annual session. Our student body and faculty counted it especially an honor to have present in their chapel services and senior exercises Dr. H. F. Reynolds, senior superintendent of our church, who also presided at the assembly.

Doctor Reynolds, notwithstanding his seventy-eight years, was seemingly as youthful as he ever was. As he would deliver a simple message from the heart, tears would flow and the Spirit would move in our midst. His illustrations of Peter, James, and John receiving a double portion of bread will long be remembered for its effectiveness.

Rev. George Franklin, missionary, delivered the evening evangelistic messages. They were to Nazarenes, and were at once inspirational and heart-searching.

Rev. E. C. Pounds was overwhelmingly re-elected to the district superintendency.

Student body officers for the year 1932-33 were elected on Thursday, May 12. George X. Coulter, Calgary, Can., was elected president; Robert Mangum, Nampa, vice president; Miss Grace Hilborn, Nampa, secretary; Howard Wiley, Ashland, Ore., treasurer; and Parker Maxey, Emmett, sergeant at arms. Glen L. Fred, Lambert, Montana, was president of the 1931-32 student body.

The Olympian literary society will present its evening contest program on Monday evening, May 16; the S. L. A.'s, theirs on Friday evening, May 20; and the Alpha Delta Phi's their program during Commencement week.

When the Oasis, college annual publication, comes out on Thursday, May 19, that day will be a banner day for members of the Oasis staff and to every member of the student body and faculty alike. Fifty junior and senior academy students attended the annual banquet in the college Club on Thursday evening, May 12. The banquet was a four-course affair. In evidence were the class colors, and two flower-embroidered gateways served as entrances to the dining room. The speeches of the evening were rendered by President DeLong, Dean Guy Sharp, junior sponsor, Paul Martin, senior class president, Parker Maxey, president of the junior class, and Prof. Albert F. Harper, sponsor of the senior class.

The spring tennis tournament will have been played by the time our readers receive the Messenger. Last fall Robert Mangum, Nampa, defeated Paul Thoreen, Alexandria, Minn., in men's singles. Miss Hazel Kjonaas emerged victorious over Miss Alice Cary, Yakima, Wash. Singles and doubles matches both will be played, each society being represented by three teams.

Shovels, hoes, rakes, lawn mowers, picks, mops, and other articles of day labor were unearthed on Thursday, April 28, when every student and faculty member reported for the annual campus day cleanup. Assembling in the chapel at eight o'clock a. m., members were assigned to the various working crews. A feature of the morning was loosening of neckties from offenders of the tradition that says, "Go without neckties on campus day."

After a morning of hard work, all crews assembled in the Club, college dining room for a gigantic cafeteria luncheon. An hour's rest put the workers in shape to climax efforts of the day at 3:30 p. m. At that hour a base ball game between faculty, college upperclassmen, and academy students, and the college lowerclassmen.

Campfires out behind the men's dorm in the dusk, prepared for a wiener roast, reminded one of tales of the West. In the evening all assembled in the Club for fun and frolic staged by members of the various crews.

An empty block of seats greeted faculty and students on Monday morning, May 9, when the Academy seniors observed their annual disappearance day. Wide awake at 4:30 a. m., the entire class left in automobiles for a day's outing in the hills. They were accompanied by Prof. Albert F. Harper, Academy principal and sponsor of the class, Dean and Mrs. Guy Sharp, and Rev. and Mrs. E. E. Martin.

No sooner had the Academy seniors departed for realms unknown when the College seniors left the same afternoon on their annual disappearance trip. Announcing in the morning chapel service a short but important meeting of the class at 3:40 p. m. Donald Harper and his committee of three sent members of the class to various parts of the city on the first lap of their disappearance.

Accompanied by President and Mrs. DeLong and Doctor Winchester, class sponsors, Dr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Mangum, Mr. and Mrs. Clive Williams, and Miss Alena Jacobson, the class spent the night in a Boise tourist camp. They spent the next day at Arrowrock Dam and at a camp in the hills. Returning at 10:00 o'clock p. m., horns honking, the seniors were greeted by the traditional turnout of members of the student body to welcome them home.

Rev. H. J. Elliott, Nampa, spoke in the mid-week prayer meeting on April 27, on "Our Duty to Others." He quoted several New Testament scriptures by Paul and James in which are found the words "one another." Eighty responded in a pop-corn testimony service.

"Four-Stop Flight of the Spirit N. N. C." was the theme carried out in the annual college junior-senior banquet on Thursday evening, May 19. Sixty were present.

With "Pilot" George Coulter, president-elect of the 1932-33 student body, "at the controls", students and guests alike enjoyed an evening of wholesome entertainment. The banquet was in four courses.

The banqueters were pleasantly surprised when Mr. Coulter read a telegram from Cupid announcing the engagement of Miss Gladys Ledingham, Galahad, Alta., Canada, to Floyd Kinzler, Jamestown, N. D.

After an address of welcome by Theodore Martin, junior class president, and response by Donald S. Harper, president of the senior class, President DeLong spoke to the classes on "Your Task". "Your task is to bring men to the 'pool'". Guests were: President DeLong, Rev. and Mrs. E. E. Martin, Dr. Olive M. Winchester, senior class sponsor, and her mother, Mrs. Sarah B. Winchester, Rev. and Mrs. Ira L. True, and Miss Laura Dean, honorary member of the senior class.
