# **Local Century Club To Sponsor Artists** In Music Concert

On the evening of March 7, at 8:30 p. m., three artists of Boise Valley will combine in a concert of piano duos, violin solos, and piano and organ duos.

Alline Swann, head of the N. N. C. Music Department and Fern Nolte Davidson are doing a group of four piano duos, two of which they arranged themselves. They will also play two concerto movements: Mozart's Concerto in A major, featuring Fern Nolte Davidson as soloist; and Rachmaninoff's Second Concerto in c minor, featuring Alline Swann. The orchestral accompaniments to each of these concertos will be taken at the pipe organ by Alline Swann and Fern Davidson, respectively.

Amalie Burnbaum, violinist of Boise, will be the assisting artist. She will play two groups of numbers: the first movement of Mendelssohn's E Minor Concerto, and a group of violin solos, including those of Bach, Kreisler, and Brahms. Her accompanist will be Mrs Leo Snyder of Boise.



But this change may not take place for perhaps ten years, seeing that the new gym, according to present plans, is the last unit to be constructed in the expansion program.

The question naturally arises, what are we going to do in the way of a Student Union during the intervening years? Are hundreds of our students going to be denied the privilege of all-around cultural development? Admittedly, there are a few students who as yet have not recognized the need of a Student church. Until recently those who have seen the need of a Student Union failed to see the possibility of its actual realization. Like students of former years they could do nothing but wait and hope for the eventual; thus plans were never developed beyond the wishing stage.

But this year it is different; a Student Union is now within the realm of possibility. The removal of heavy equipment from the printing shop renders usable a large floor space, which in combination with the adjoining shop room is adequate for a Student Union. These unused rooms could be remodeled into a kitchen, fountain bar, and recreation room. A rough estimate of the cost of such remodeling and installation of equipment would be seven hundred dollars—a very small investment in proportion to the real and practical value of a Student Union.

There will be many difficulties on the road to the realization of such a project; among them could be mentioned the problems of finance, materials, labour, and the procurement of a full time supervisor. These problems are not unsurmountable, but their solution will challenge our determination to have ganization in a position to sponsor good thing shall I do, that I may will, and to correct those trifling a Student Union and a greater N. The question is, Do we want a Student Union this semester? If so, let's organize and start the job, and let our slogan be, "EVENTUALLY, WHY NOT NOW?"


#### Report on Germany
