"We are each a story" is the title of Museum Director Schroeder's presentation on February 13 at the Academy luncheon

Last December I mentioned to a group of visitors to the Spanish Cove Retirement Village in Yukon that I had invited Charles P. "Chuck" Schroeder to speak at the February 13, 2012, luncheon. A gentleman in the group said, "Please let me write down that time, date, and place before we go any farther, Jack David. I will go anywhere to hear Chuck speak again." I share those sentiments with the gentleman.

Mr. Schroeder is no stranger to the Academy of Senior Professionals (ASP) at Southern Nazarene University (SNU). I first heard him speak at an ASP luncheon meeting circa 2005 and then again at the ASP-sponsored Senior Adult Conference in May 2011.

In his February 13, 2012, *Power-Point* presentation, Mr. Schroeder's principle theme will be that the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum is a storytelling institution. The story of any place or time is really the story of the people who lived there or then. However, just as we are fascinated with the big stories, we should recognize that each person we meet is a walking story, filled with its own unique adventures and life lessons that contribute to the story of a culture of a nation.

Mr. Schroeder is a native of western Nebraska ranch country and who now serves as the President of the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. New to the museum in 2002, he has held other leadership positions in the public, private, and non-profit sectors, most recently as the Chief Executive Officer of the National Cattlemen's Beef Association. He is a graduate of the University of Nebraska with a Bachelor of Science degree in Animal Science and later returned to his alma mater as the Executive Vice-President of the University of Nebraska Foundation, following a term as Nebraska's Director of Agriculture. He is currently on the boards of the Greater Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, Museums West, the Oklahoma State Fair, Rotary Club 29, Sirloin Club of Oklahoma, and an advisory board for the Oklahoma Arts Institute. Previous volunteer leadership roles include terms as chairman of the Council for Agricultural Research, Extension and Teaching, president of the Heartland Center for Leadership Development, chairman of the Beef Industry Food Safety Council, and a founding board member of the Rural Policy Research Institute and Agriculture Future of America. He has also served as a member for the International Stockmen's Education Foundation and Payne Education Center.

Special recognitions include the Oklahoma Humanities Council Community Leadership Award, the National Cowboy Symposium Western Museum Award, the Nebraska University College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources Alumnus Award, the Ak-Sar-Ben Agricultural Achievement Award, and inclusion in *Who's Who in the Western Livestock Industry.*

Mr. Schroeder is an active team roper, and his interests span American Quarter Horses, art, rodeo, political history, and livestock genetics among other facets of the American West. He is married to Kathi, a high school special education instructor in Edmond, Oklahoma. They have one daughter, Lindsay Hastings, a Ph.D. candidate in Higher Education Leadership at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and Executive Director of the Nebraska Human Resources Institute, as well as being the mother of their granddaughter, Lillian Grace Hastings.

Your President's Point of View Loving Deeds by Emmalvn German

As we mature into these retirement years, the experiences of losing loved ones are beginning to mount up. Sometimes our loss is sudden and unexpected; while at other times the grieving process begins while our loved one is still living because they have dementia or Alzheimer's disease. There are so many questions to answer about how to care for them, and what the process will be like. We dare not look forward because the struggles we face each day are enough, and we can't imagine what the future will hold for us.

While these are sad times, sometimes they hold very humorous situations. One such experience happened in our family when it was time to take my husband's father from his home in the Philadelphia area down to a secure home for Alzheimer's patients near my brother in law's home in Florida. Clarence had three sons, Paul, the oldest, Bob, the middle son, and Dale, the youngest, and my husband.

My father-in-law had always had a short fuse, and was quite intimidating to nearly everyone he met. Once he had a waitress so befuddled that she poured salad dressing into his coffee. If someone younger than him made the mistake of calling him by his first name he might never speak to that person again. Once while transporting him across town he tried to escape the car while it was still in motion, and that situation was very dangerous for all concerned. When we discovered that Dad had dementia it was difficult for us to find a comfortable place for him, but it was definitely unsafe for him to remain at home by himself. For these reasons and a few more, Paul thought it would be best to sedate Dad for the move from Philadelphia to Florida as he would not go willingly, and would likely be very difficult to handle. It took Paul quite a while to find a doctor who was willing to give him a prescription for this, but when he finally found one and had the prescription in hand the time had come to make the transition.

Paul traveled from his home in the Boston area, and Dale flew in from Portland, Oregon and they all met (Continued on page 6)

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A Membership Perk

Members of the Academy of Senior Professionals have the privilege of using the resources of the Southern Nazarene University library. This includes materials in the library as well as accessing numerous external databases from your personal computer without even leaving home!



The extent of these external sources is quite impressive, and means that searches one might wish to undertake are not restricted to Google and Wikipedia.

However, it does require, 1) that you get some elementary instructions as to how to proceed, and 2) that you obtain a proper SNU ID with an IT (Information Technology) number.

The February 13 Morning Seminar, beginning at 9:30 a.m., will be devoted to demonstrating how to connect your computer to the library's computer, and then how to do the searches.

Dr. Arlita Harris, director of the University Library, will conduct this seminar. Dr. Harris has a B.S. degree in English from the Illinois State University, an M.S. in library science from the University of Illinois, and the Ph.D. in public administration from the University of Texas at Arlington.

Probably more to the point, she has extensive experience in showing students how to do what she will demonstrate for you. Check out her column in this publication for more details.

To obtain a proper SNU ID card, obtain an IT number from Eunice Trent, director of ASP, after which you can take the number to the room across the hall from our seminar room in Webster Commons where they will issue you a card.



LIBRARY NEWS SNU RESOURCES

Before you come to the February 13 Morning Seminar, contact Eunice Trent (405-491-6311 or etrent@snu.edu) to update your SNU ID card (or get one for the first time). Take the information she gives you to Sallye Siems in the Student Development Office across the hall from the Tullis Room to get your card with an updated bar code. If you've had a card that isn't updated, she can even use your "younger" photo on the new one! If you already have an updated SNU ID card, just check the barcode to make certain there is a number that begins with 2303 printed under the barcode. Then you'll know that the library's databases will work for you.

During the Monday Seminar, which begins at 9:30 a.m. in the Tullis Room on the first floor of the Webster Commons, I'll be showing you how to use the SNU Library's website at www.snu.edu/library. You'll learn how to check on the materials which the library owns so you can go to the shelves and find it when entering the library. You'll learn how to find articles in the library's databases, then save future articles in a folder that you can access at any time. I'll even show you how to read current journals online and be notified when they are available.

We'll also look at ways to plan for your vacations and prepare for international visitors through resources such as Culturegrams and Virtual Tourist. Through Lexis Nexis, you can find out a company or stock you are tracking or you can read newspapers from other cities and countries and research countries and people.

There are links to free e-books, free video resources, and a vast amount of other information, all included in your \$16 per year ASP membership which gives you SNU Library privileges.

I look forward to meeting with you on Monday, February 13, in the Tullis Room, 1st floor of Webster Commons, at 9:30 a.m.
