Under the leadership of Vice President of Academic Affairs, Dr. Melany Kyzer, the Office of Academic Affairs coordinates and supports the work of all the academic programs and services of Southern Nazarene University. She is responsible for the administration of five academic colleges: Colleges of Business,



Education and Kinesiology; College of Humanities; College of Natural, Social and Health Sciences; College of Teaching and Learning; and College of Professional and Graduate Studies. GERMANS IN SWAZILAND

The work here is over one hundred years old. All my life: from mom when I was a boy and from missionaries, I have heard of Raleigh Fitkin Memorial Hospital. It was named by grieving parents after their son's premature death before fulfilling his dream to be a medical missionary. In 1910 Harmon Schmelzenbach left college without graduating because of a call of God weighing upon his heart to go to Africa. There were no greeters to welcome him here. Eventually others came. The King of Swaziland had a dream. Two men would come to him. One with a coin. One with a book. He was to listen to the man with the book, and the man with the book would have hair like straw and blue eves. The king liked Harmon Schmelzenbach. He encouraged the missionaries to build a hospital. That Hospital is Raleigh Fitkin Memorial Hospital. Today I saw 700 patients who come daily. There are 350 beds, 15 doctors, an emergency room, pediatric unit, eye clinic, and dental clinic, and much more. People walk miles to get to the hospital and wait in long lines to see the doctors. Today in our dental clinic the first digital imaging x-ray in Swaziland was made.

The work begun by missionaries is now carried forward by godly dedicated hard working Africans doing it for themselves. Standing with them are compassionate volunteers from other places like our Bethany Partnership with Swaziland. Swaziland is the only monarchy in Africa today. The monarchy smiles on the Church of the Nazarene. In Manzini our work in Swaziland is centered at the heart of the largest city of the nation. Everybody here knows the name Nazarene thanks to Raleigh Fitkin Memorial Hospital, Gerrald Gasset Memorial Dental Clinic, Waiting Hearts maternity home, Africa Nazarene Theological College, and Churches of the Nazarene populating the city in prime locations. cdg

"Soar from where God's planted you" is the theme for the 2014-2015 year. It is based upon Jeremiah 29: 4-7

"This is what the Lord Almighty, the God of Israel, says to all those I carried into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and settle down; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Marry and have sons and daughters; find wives for your sons and give your daughters in marriage, so that they too may have sons and daughters. Increase in number there; do not decrease. Also, seek the peace and prosperity of the city to which I have carried you into exile. Pray to the Lord for it, because if it prospers, you too will prosper."

I grew up in the 1960's in Central Illinois during a time of rebellion, uncertainty, and discovery. It was the generation of ecology, flag-burning, race riots, hippies, the peace movement, and the idea that we should "bloom where we are planted." As I became a Christian, my motto changed to "Bloom where God plants you" and now, in ASP, to "Soar from where God's planted you."

In 2001, I moved seven times – two of those moves were to and from Nairobi, Kenya. Each of the moves was a significant change in my life as I also discovered that my husband was dying, but I had opportunities to soar where God planted me.

On May 31, 2001, as we were traveling from Kenyatta Airport to our new home at Africa Nazarene University, we crossed a riverbed that flooded each spring, cutting off access to the ANU campus. My first thought was "they

need a bridge". As I talked to others in my new home on campus, there was consensus that a bridge was needed, but it would cost \$19,000 and needed the attention of the Kenyan government in order to be a priority.



Raising the money was relatively easy. I had been one of the first female Rotarians since 1989 and knew about the Paul Harris Foundation's international partnership projects. I contacted my Clearwater, Florida Rotary Club and they sponsored the bridge project through the international foundation. I then met with the East Africa regional president of Rotary International; he was a Hindu businessman in Nairobi and was responsible for Rotary clubs in five countries. He agreed with the need for a bridge and the funds became available for this international project. The most challenging part was getting the attention of the Kenyan government so the bridge would become a priority. The Vice Chancellor of Africa Nazarene University, Leah Marangu, invited the Vice-President of Kenya, George Saitoti, to speak at a harambee at ANU. A harambee is a fund-raising event, a Kenyan tradition of community self-help and pulling together to complete a project. Harambee is the official motto of Kenya and appears on its coat of arms. The harambee was to raise money for the bridge.

Many important people came to the harambee on the ANU campus. They were dressed in ornate traditional costumes. Our ANU student musical groups performed and the Kenyan vice president spoke. The media attended. Everyone who came saw the condition of the road to the campus and the need for a bridge. Funds raised that day were added to the Rotary International contribution and work began shortly on the bridge.

I was only at ANU from May 31 to September 8, but during that time, I had an opportunity to "soar from where God had planted me" for that season. As I left Kenya, our bus drove over the bridge that was nearing completion. I saw a need that could bring people together to fix it. I returned to the United States two days before 9/11.

God has brought each of us to the Oklahoma City metro area, to Southern Nazarene University, and to the Academy of Senior Professionals during this year to soar where He planted us. What can



we do? What do you complain about each time you pass it? What do you wish someone" would fix? What can YOU and our members do between now and May, 2015 to make a difference in our community? Let's make our May meeting our Harambee Celebration as we share our success stories!

Ari Fleischer

As former White House press secretary, Ari Fleischer was the primary spokesperson for President Bush and delivered the daily White House briefings from 2001 to 2003. He previously served as the spokesman for the Bush-Cheney presidential campaign. In his almost four years



working for George W. Bush, he served as spokesman during the historic presidential recount, September 11th, two wars and the anthrax attack. His best-selling book, *Taking Heat*, details his years in the White House and reached #7 on The New York Times best seller list.

NAOMI WYNELL EMMEL

Naomi Wynell (Bolerjack) Emmel passed away July 3, 2014, at Spanish Cove Retirement Village in Yukon, at the age of 89. She was born August 31, 1924, in Cushing, Oklahoma, where her father pastored the Church of the Nazarene. As a child she lived in Bartlesville, Oklahoma and Independence, Kansas.

She graduated with a B.S. in Spanish and English from Bethany Peniel College (now Southern Nazarene University) and did graduate work at Oklahoma University and in Mexico where she received a Master's Degree in Spanish and Mexican Culture. She met and married Bob Emmel while teaching at Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa, Idaho and at Southern Nazarene University.

She taught school in Pennsylvania, Germany, and at Pasadena College in California. Naomi spent 21 years in San Luis Obispo, CA, where she was a homemaker and sold real estate. They moved to Oklahoma City in 1995, and settled at Spanish Cove in 2003 where she lived for 11 years until her death. Naomi was an active and involved member of the Church of the Nazarene wherever she lived.

She was preceded in death by her beloved husband Bob in 2007. She is survived by her son Peter Emmel and wife Debbie of Atascadero, CA; two grandchildren, Lindsay and husband Reno Hawley of San Luis Obispo, CA, and James Emmel of Atascadero; and one brother, R.T. Bolerjack and wife Pat of Oklahoma City.

THE GREAT DIVORCE BY C.S. LEWIS

In *The Great Divorce* Lewis uses fable and allegory to tell us his views on Heaven and Hell, good and evil, and what all they mean. In the preface, Lewis says that Blake wrote the Marriage of Heaven and Hell. Then continues, he does not think of himself a fit antagonist for so great a genius, nor even is he sure what Blake meant. However, it seems that it gave him incentive to do a soul search and write this little gem.

Discussion Guidelines

- 1. The first principle of good discussion is to agree to disagree without being disagreeable.
- 2. The book must be read to be able to discuss.
- 3. The moderator will ask for issues that were found in the reading.
- 4. The moderator will ask one person a question to start the discussion and will only ask further questions, if necessary.
- 5. Feel free to read passages you particularly liked or disliked, or to make something clear that you wish to explain.
- 6. Have fun and learn from others. Be polite. Listen to others. Talk one person at a time.

Future Book Discussions

January — *The Black Tower* by P. D. James James' characters come to life and will hold your attention as well as her use of words themselves. The truth will come out in her mystery novels as it does in this one.

March — Home by Toni Morrison

Morrison is a Noble Prize winner for her literary writing. Once again, as in the other selections for our book discussion, good and evil are explored in a completely different setting. We move from England to a truly American story. This is a story of one man trying to escape his too small world and what lead him back home.
